


Lot 4 Septic

Anomaly **N141.5 E146.2** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 50 by 40 cm and being (10YR4/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 45 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 55 cmbgs. In profile the stain was a shallow basin with numerous linear stains going deeper below the main body of the stain. Cultural material recovered consisted of fire-cracked rock and quartz debitage. This anomaly was interpreted as a shallow basin.








Anomaly **N142.7 E147.3** was a semi-circular-shaped stain emerging from the septic impact area wall that measured 50 cm wide and emerged 20 cm from the wall and being brown (10YR4/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 40 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 55 cmbgs. In profile the stain had steeply sloping sides. Cultural material recovered consisted of fire-cracked rock and quartz debitage. This anomaly was interpreted as a medium-sized medium depth cultural pit.





Anomaly **N144.4 E149.1** was a round-shaped stain measuring 60 cm in diameter and being dark grayish brown (10YR4/2) in color. The stain first appeared at 45 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 65 cmbgs. In profile the stain had a steeply sloping northern wall and a gradually sloping southern wall. Cultural material recovered consisted of quartz debitage, Native pottery, and fire-cracked rock. The fire-cracked rock was concentrated at the 55 cmbgs level. This anomaly was interpreted as a medium-sized medium depth cultural pit.



Anomaly **N144.5 E145.5** was a round-shaped stain measuring 85 by 70 cm and being dark grayish brown (10YR4/2) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 80 cmbgs. The stain was very amorphous in profile until 50 cmbgs where it resolved itself into a circular stain with mottled pockets of soil. In profile the stain was gradually to steeply sided flat-bottomed pit with three fill deposits. Fill Deposit 1, which was light olive brown (2.5Y5/4) in color, extended from 30 to 80 cmbgs in the western third of the pit. Fill Deposit 2, which was olive yellow (2.5Y6/6), was located in the center of the pit extending from 45 to 77 cmbgs. Fill Deposit 3, which was dark grayish brown (10YR4/2) in color, was on the surface and extended to 45 cmbgs. Fill Deposit 3 contained a concentration of fire-cracked rock resting on the surface of the anomaly. Cultural material recovered consisted of fire-cracked rock, one quartz small triangular point, one rhyolite point, quartz debitage, calcined bone, and charcoal. This anomaly was interpreted as a large size, deep cultural pit, possibly a storage pit reused as a refuse pit and a possible hearth.





Anomaly **N145 E142.3** was an oval shaped stain that was bisected by the septic impact area wall measuring 23cm long and extending 23 cm into the impact area. The stain was brown (10YR4/3) in color and first appeared at 35 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface. It extended to 55 cmbgs. In profile the stain tapered and was irregularly shaped. It eventually turned to the south. No cultural material was recovered. This anomaly was interpreted as a rodent run.



Anomaly **N145 E144** was a round-shaped stain measuring 100 cm in diameter and was brown (10YR5/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 40 cmbgs. In profile the stain was very shallow with five postmolds being present under it. The stain may represent an erosional basin near the edge of a house. Cultural material recovered consisted of rhyolite and quartz debitage, one quartz projectile point, Native pottery and fire-cracked rock. This anomaly was interpreted as a shallow possibly natural basin associated with erosion at the edge of a house.







Anomaly **N145.7 E142.9** was a round-shaped stain measuring 35 cm in diameter and being brown (10YR5/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 35 cmbgs. In profile the stain was a shallow basin. No cultural material was recovered. This anomaly was interpreted as a natural stain.


Anomaly **N145.15 E146** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 35 by 55 cm and being very dark brown (10YR2/2) in color. The stain first appeared at 40 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 70 cmbgs. In profile the stain had gently to steeply sloping walls and a squared floor. Two fill deposits were present. Fill Deposit 1 extended on the east side of the anomaly from 50 to 70 cmbgs and was mottled yellowish brown and light olive brown (10YR5/4 and 2.5Y5/4) in color. Fill Deposit 2 was located in the center of the pit and extended from the surface from 50 to 65 cmbgs and was very dark brown (10YR 2/2) in color. Cultural material recovered consisted of fire-cracked rock, quartz debitage, and calcined bone, all from Fill Deposit 2. This anomaly was interpreted as a medium-sized medium depth cultural pit.






Anomaly **N145.75 E146.4** was a round-shaped stain measuring 30 cm in diameter and being very dark gray (2.5Y5/4) in color with a high concentration of charcoal. The stain first appeared at 50 cmbs during the excavation of an anomaly to the south. It extended to 100 cmbs. In profile the stain was wide at the surface and narrowed to a point at the bottom with the lower two-thirds being dark olive brown (2.5Y3/3) in color. Cultural material recovered consisted of charcoal and quartz debitage. This anomaly was interpreted as a burned tree tap root possibly from a nut (hickory, walnut, etc.) or white oak tree.



Anomaly **N146 E145.3** was a round-shaped stain measuring 80 by 83 cm and being brown (10YR4/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 40 cmbgs. In profile the stain had gradually sloping walls and a rock in the western half. A post mold was associated with the eastern edge of the stain. Cultural material recovered consisted of Native pottery. This anomaly was interpreted as a large shallow cultural basin.







Anomaly **N146.15 E141.2** was a round-shaped stain measuring 20 cm in diameter and being brown (10YR5/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 60 cmbgs. In profile the stain was a slightly angled possibly historic post mold. Cultural material recovered consisted of one machine-cut nail. This anomaly was interpreted as a large post mold, possibly historic.


Anomaly **N146.8 E142.4** was a round-shaped stain measuring 40 cm in diameter and being dark brown (10YR3/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 40 cmbgs, beneath a fire-cracked rock concentration. It extended to 55 cmbgs. In profile the stain had gradually sloping sides and a rounded bottom. Cultural material recovered consisted of quartz and rhyolite debitage, charcoal, and fire-cracked rock. This anomaly was interpreted as a small to medium sized medium depth pit which was subsequently capped by a FCR concentration or hearth.



Anomaly **N147.2 E142.5** was a large amorphous-shaped fire-cracked rock concentration measuring by 150 cm long and extending out of the septic impact wall 100 cm. The matrix within which the FCR was imbedded was dark yellowish brown (10YR4/6) in color. The concentration first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 40 cmbgs. In profile the FCR was located within a shallow area of slightly discolored soils. Cultural material recovered consisted of fire-cracked rock, Native pottery, charcoal, and quartz debitage. This anomaly was interpreted as a fire-cracked rock concentration, possibly representing a dump area as no fire-reddened or oxidized soils were present.



Anomaly **N147.55 E140.4** was a figure-eight-shaped stain measuring 100 by 70 cm and being brown (10YR4/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extending to 60 cmbgs. In profile the stain consisted of two moderately steep to steep sided pits, labeled A and B during excavation. Pit A the southern most, measured 60 cm in diameter and extended to 60 cmbgs. It consisted of two fill deposits. Fill Deposit 1 extended from 45 to 60 cmbgs and was dark grayish brown (10YR 4/2) in color. Fill Deposit 2 extended from 30 to 45 cmbgs and was brown (10YR4/3) in color. Cultural material recovered from Stain A consisted of Native pottery, fire-cracked rock, calcined bone, a quartz core, and quartz debitage. Stain B measured 50 by 55 cm and extended to 55 cmbgs. Two fill deposits were present in this stain. Fill Deposit 1 extended from 50 to 55 cmbgs and was dark grayish brown (10YR 4/2) in color. Fill Deposit 2 extended from 30 to 50 cmbgs and was brown (10YR4/3) in color. Cultural material recovered from Stain B consisted of quartz debitage, charcoal, and calcined bone. These anomalies were interpreted as medium-sized, medium depth cultural pits.





Anomaly **N147.7 E141.8** was a small round-shaped stain measuring 15 by 12 cm and being brown (10YR5/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface and extending to 35 cmbgs. In profile the stain was a shallow basin with an irregular floor consisting of several linear root stains extending below the bottom of the stain. No cultural material was recovered. This anomaly was interpreted as a natural stain created by floral action.




Anomaly **N147.8 E147.4** was a oval-shaped stain that was bisected by the septic impact envelope wall and extending 90 cm into it. The stain was 68 cm wide and dark grayish brown (10YR4/2) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 65 cmbgs. In profile the stain had steeply sloping walls and a flat bottom. Two postmolds was encountered in the anomaly, one bisected by the north wall profile and one bisected by the wall of the septic impact area. Four fill deposits were present in the anomaly. Fill Deposit 1 extended from 45 to 65 cmbgs in the east wall profile and tapered to only a few centimeters wide in the center of the anomaly. This deposit was strong brown (7.5YR5/8) in color and contained fire-reddened soils. Fill Deposit 2 was located to the west and north of Fill Deposit 1 as well as on top of it. Fill Deposit 2 extended from 30 to 70 cmbgs and was olive brown (2.5Y4/4) in color. The two postmolds encountered were located within this fill deposit. Fill Deposit 3 was located above Fill Deposit 2 and to the south of Fill Deposit 2. It consisted of dark grayish brown (10YR4/2) colored soils extending from the surface to 70 cmbgs at its deepest. A possible post mold may be located at the center of this deposit where it extended deeper into Fill Deposit 2. Fill Deposit 4 was the soil located within the post mold in the northern half of the anomaly. It was dark grayish brown (10YR4/2) in color. Cultural material recovered consisted of Native pottery, quartz debitage, fire-cracked rock and a quartz small triangle from Fill Deposit 3, charcoal, quartz debitage, calcined bone and fire-cracked rock from Fill Deposit 2, and charcoal and quartz debitage from Fill Deposit 1. This anomaly was interpreted as a possible roasting pit (Fill Deposits 1 and 2) subsequently re-excavated as a medium sized medium depth pit (Fill Deposit 3).



Anomaly **N148 E146.1** was a figure-eight-shaped stain measuring 190 by 100 cm and being dark brown and dark yellowish brown (10YR3/3 and 10YR4/6) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 55 cmbgs. In profile the stain was composed of two joined pits with steeply sloped edges and an associated post mold to the north. The southern stain contained a number of cobbles while the northern stain had cobbles in the subsoil around it. Cultural material recovered consisted of jasper and quartz debitage, calcined bone, and charcoal. This anomaly was interpreted as two medium-sized, medium-depth cultural pits and an associated post mold.





Anomaly **N148.2 E139.6** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 40 cm long and being bisected by the septic impact area wall. Twenty centimeters of the stain projected from the west wall of the septic envelope into the impact area. The stain was dark olive brown (2.5Y3/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 26 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 55cmbgs. In profile the stain had steeply sloping walls and several larger cobbles throughout. A large number of Native pottery fragments, all from one vessel, were recovered from 40 to 50 cmbgs. These pieces were on top of and in the middle of the rocks. Cultural material recovered consisted of most of a Native pot, and calcined bone. The western half of this pit, which lay 50 cm outside of the impact area was subsequently excavated. This anomaly was interpreted as a medium-sized medium depth pit containing a large number of large fragments that could be reassembled into an almost complete Native pot. This suggests that the pit may have originally been used to store a pot in, possibly over the course of season when the site was not in use.



Anomaly **N148.3 E141.25** was a roughly oval-shaped stain measuring 60 by 40 cm and being brown (10YR5/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface and extended to 60 cmbgs. In profile the stain had steep sides and a rounded bottom. Cultural material recovered consisted of graphite, calcined bone, quartz debitage, charcoal, Native pottery, shell, fish scales, unburned deer pelvis, and fire-cracked rock. The fish scales, deer pelvis and surf clam shell fragments were recovered from the 45 to 55 cmbgs levels. This anomaly was interpreted as a medium-sized medium depth cultural pit.





Anomaly **N148.6 E143** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 52 by 28 cm and being brown (10YR4/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbs, the Apz/ B1 interface and extended to 40 cmbs. In profile the stain was an irregularly shaped shallow basin with several linear stains extending below the bottom further into the subsoil. Cultural material recovered consisted of quartz debitage and calcined bone from the 30 to 35 cmbs level. This anomaly was interpreted as a shallow basin, likely the result of floral activity.





Anomaly **N148.8 E145.4** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 70 by 55 cm and being dark grayish brown (10YR 4/2) in color. The stain first appeared at 35 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 65 cmbgs. In profile the stain had gently sloping sides and a rounded bottom. Two fill deposits were present. Fill 1 Deposit extended from 50 to 65 cmbgs and was very dark grayish brown (10YR 3/2) in color. Fill Deposit 2 extended from 35 to 50 cmbgs and was dark grayish brown (10YR 4/2) in color. Cultural material recovered differed between the two fills. Fill Deposit 1 contained abundant fish scales, surf clam shell fragments and charcoal. Fill Deposit 2 contained Native pottery, quartz debitage, and fire-cracked rock. This anomaly was interpreted as a medium-sized medium depth pit.




Anomaly **N149.1 E144.7** was a round-shaped stain measuring 60 by 65 cm and being dark grayish brown (10YR4/2) in color. The stain first appeared at 35 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface and extended to 58 cmbgs. In profile the stain had a gently sloping south wall and a steeper north wall that was connected to the anomaly (N149.4 E145.1) to the north. Two fill deposits were identified, a dark olive brown (2.5Y3/3) upper Fill 2 Deposit and a dark grayish brown (10YR4/2) lower Fill 1 Deposit. Fill Deposit 1 extended from 50 to 58 cmbgs and Fill Deposit 2 extended from 30 to 50 cmbgs. Cultural material recovered consisted of Native pottery, quartz debitage, bird bone, charcoal from 30 to 45 cmbgs, and shell, fish scales and a single turkey bone from 45 to 50 cmbgs. This anomaly was interpreted as a medium-sized, medium-depth cultural pit.

Anomaly **N149.4 E145.1** was a round-shaped stain measuring 70 by 60 cm and being dark grayish brown (10YR4/2) in color. The stain first appeared at 35 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface and extended to 55 cmbgs. In profile the stain had a gently sloping north and south walls with the south wall being connected to the anomaly (N149.1 E144.7) to the south. One fill deposit, dark grayish brown (10YR 4/2) in color, was identified that extended to the anomaly to the south. Cultural material recovered consisted of Native pottery, quartz debitage, charcoal. This anomaly lacked the fish scales and shell present in the adjacent anomaly. This anomaly was interpreted as a medium-sized, medium-depth cultural pit.



Anomaly **N149.7 E142.6** was a large oval-shaped stain measuring 83 by 70 cm and being a mottled brown and yellowish brown (10YR4/3 and 10YR5/6) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface and extending to 55 cmbgs. In profile the stain was gently sloping sides and a mottled brown and yellowish brown (10YR4/3 and 10YR5/6) in color. Cultural material recovered consisted of Native pottery, fire-cracked rock, calcined bone, quartz and rhyolite debitage, and a quartzite Brewerton projectile point. This anomaly was interpreted as a large sized medium depth pit.

Anomaly **N150.5 E142.8** was a small oval-shaped stain measuring 40 by 30 cm and being brown (10YR4/3) in color. The stain first appeared at 30 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 45 cmbgs. In profile the stain was an irregularly shaped basin with a heavy rock and gravel concentration at the bottom. Cultural material recovered consisted of charcoal, Native pottery, and quartz and rhyolite debitage from 30 to 35 cmbgs. This anomaly was interpreted as a shallow basin with cultural material in the upper layer.







Anomaly **N151.8 E143** was an oval-shaped fire-cracked rock concentration that was bisected by the septic envelope wall. The concentration measured 100 cm long and extended 30 cm out of the wall. The concentration first appeared at 25 cm bgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 40 cm bgs. The matrix around the FCR was dark yellowish brown (10YR4/6) in color. In profile the concentration was a shallow layer of FCR with some staining around and below. Cultural material recovered consisted of fire-cracked rock and charcoal. This anomaly was interpreted as a fire-cracked rock possible dump area or hearth, although no associated oxidized or fire-reddened soil was present.
