



## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N129 E181.7** was a roughly circular-shaped stain measuring 65 by 68 cm and being dark grayish brown (10YR 4/2) in color. This stain was first visible at 40 cmbgs at the Apz/ B1 interface. Excavation revealed a medium-sized, medium-depth pit which extended to 60 cmbgs. Cultural material recovered included quartz debitage, charcoal, calcined bone, Native pottery and a quartz biface.



## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N129.9 E189.8** was a small round-shaped stain measuring 20 by 35 cm and being dark grayish brown (10YR 4/2) in color at 40 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface. The stain extended to 70 cmbgs and appeared to represent a rodent run-it was consistently the same diameter and it ran off at an angle away from the surface. Cultural material recovered consisted of quartz and rhyolite debitage and charcoal from 40 to 60 cmbgs.







## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N130.5 E191** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 45 by 75 cm and being very dark grayish brown (10YR3/2) at 40 cmbgs, which was the Apz/ B1 interface. Fragments of fire-cracked rock and charcoal were recovered at 40 to 50 cmbgs. Only charcoal was recovered from the remainder of the anomaly, which extended to 75 cmbgs. In profile the stain was shaped as a slight to inward sloping sided round-bottomed medium depth, medium-sized pit. It appears to be a medium-sized pit which was filled and may have either secondarily served as a hearth location or as a place into which hearth debris was deposited.



### Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N130.6 E185.7** was an oval-shaped concentration of fire-cracked rock measuring 50 by 30 cm with a surrounding soil matrix that was yellowish brown (10YR5/6) in color when the concentration was first exposed at the Apz/ B1 interface, located at 40 cmbgs. The fire cracked rock concentration was only five centimeters deep and was not accompanied by any oxidizing or reddening of the surrounding soil, possibly indicating that this represented a dump location versus a hearth. Only scattered pieces of charcoal accompanied this concentration, no other cultural material.






Anomaly **N130.7 E178.7** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 55 by 40 cm. It was dark grayish brown (10YR 4/2) in color at 40 cmbgs where it first appeared. Possible postmolds were located to the north and south of it. The stain extended to 65 cmbgs and appeared to be a medium-sized, medium-depth pit which was used to dispose of hearth refuse. Cultural material recovered consisted of Native pottery, small quartz debitage, fish vertebrae, charcoal, rhyolite debitage and fire-cracked rock.



## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N131 E181** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 113 by 85 cm and being dark brown (10YR3/3) in color at 40 cmbgs, which was the Apz/ B1 interface. The stain had poorly-defined edges at 40 cmbgs and appeared as a larger oval stain with a smaller 20 cm long linear extension projecting off at an 45 degree angle from the main stain. As excavation proceeded, the stain resolved itself by 55 cmbgs into a round stain measuring 30 cm in diameter and a post mold appeared in the extension. Other postmolds were located to the south and northwest of the anomaly. In profile this anomaly appeared as a 25 cm deep pit with sloping sides. Cultural material recovered consisted of quartz and rhyolite debitage, charcoal, calcined bone, and a Poplar Island type point (found at 60 cmbgs). This stain is interpreted as a medium sized shallow pit or basin that was cultural in origin. It is unclear what the original function as, but it may have served secondarily as a refuse disposal area.


## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N131.3 E184.5** was an oval shaped stain measuring 57 by 50 cm and being brown (10YR 4/3) in color at 40 cmbgs where it was first visible. The stain extended to 65 cmbgs and appeared as a medium-sized pit with slightly sloping walls and a flat floor. Cultural material recovered consisted of Native pottery, fire-cracked rock, charcoal, and rhyolite and quartz debitage.


Anomaly **N132 E184.5** was a round-shaped stain measuring 72 by 70 cm and being brown (10YR 4/3) in color at 40 cmbgs, the Apz/B1 interface where it was first encountered. One eight centimeter in diameter post mold was located adjacent to the southeast quadrant of the stain. The stain extended to a depth of 55 cmbgs. In profile it appeared as a shallow basin with shallowly sloping sides and a rounded bottom. An additional post mold was identified under the stain in the southwest quarter. This post mold was 8 cm in diameter and in line with others to the south. Cultural material recovered consisted of Native pottery, fire-cracked rock, charcoal, calcined bone, and quartz debitage, all from 40-50 cmbgs with the majority being recovered from 40-45 cmbgs. This stain was interpreted as a medium-sized shallow basin, possibly cultural in origin or natural with a cultural refuse deposit on the top.



## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N131.5 E190.3** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 82 by 50 cm and being dark brown (10YR3/3) in color at 40 cmbgs, which was the Apz/ B1 interface. In profile this stain appeared as a round bottomed pit with quartz debitage, charcoal, an Native pottery being recovered from 40-55 cmbgs. The bottom of the stain was encountered at 65 cmbgs. This stain was interpreted as a medium-size medium-depth pit.






## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N132 E177.75** was a circular to oval-shaped fire-cracked rock concentration measuring 122 by 145 cm. It was encountered two centimeters below the Apz/ B1 interface at 42 cmbgs and appears to be older than the surrounding occupation evidence. The soil matrix around the fire cracked rock was dark grayish brown (10YR4/2) in color and the concentration only extended to 45 cmbgs. Cultural material recovered consisted of fire-cracked rock, charcoal, and quartz debitage. No oxidized soil or reddening was observed and this may represent a fire cracked rock dump versus a hearth location



## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N132.1 E181.3** was a round-shaped stain with a 50 cm diameter and being dark brown (10YR3/3) in color at 40 cmbgs, he Apz/B1 interface where it was first encountered. The stain extended to 55 cmbgs with fire-cracked rock and quartz debitage being recovered from 40-45 cmbgs. In profile the stain was visible as a shallow basin with gently sloping sides and a rounded bottom. .



## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N132.2 E180.1** was an oval-shaped stain with a large rock adjacent to the south edge on the surface at 40 cmbgs. The stain was olive brown (2.5Y4/3) on the surface. This color continued to the bottom of the stain, 55 cmbgs. A rock on the south edge began to encroach further to the north, shrinking the width of the stain. The stain eventually shrank to a narrow linear stain which was interpreted as a possible root stain. Native pottery and quartz debitage were recovered from 40-50 cmbgs. This stain was interpreted as a shallow basin, possibly cultural.

Anomaly **N132.7 E180.15** was round-shaped stain measuring 40 cm in diameter at the Apz/ B1 interface which was encountered at 40 cmbgs. The stain was olive brown (2.5Y4/3) in color and extended five centimeters into the subsoil. Cultural material recovered consisted on quartz and rhyolite debitage and charcoal. This stain was interpreted as a shallow basin, possibly natural.



## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N132.5 E192** was an oval shaped stain that measured 68 by 74 cm at 40 cmbgs. It was olive brown (2.5Y4/3) in color and extended only to 50 cmbgs. In profile it appeared to be a medium-sized shallow basin that was possibly cultural. Cultural material recovered consisted of bone, charcoal and quartz and rhyolite debitage.






## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N132.5 E194** was an oval-shaped stain that was bisected on the east by the turkey coop wall. The stain measured 40 cm by 60 and was olive brown (2.5Y 4/3) in color at 40 cmbgs, which was the Apz/ B1 interface. In profile this stain appeared as a strait-sided, flat-bottomed medium-sized pit which extended from 40 to 65 cmbgs. Cultural material recovered consisted of calcined bone, charcoal, and quartz debitage. One larger stone was positioned in the center of the pit extending from 45 to 60 cmbgs. The fill was homogeneous in color and consistency, suggesting rapid filling in one episode.





## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N132.8 E182.1** was an amorphous-shaped stain that measured 50 by 60 cm at its widest points. It was brown (10YR4/3) in color at 40 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface, and extended to 50 cmbgs. Cultural material recovered consisted of quartz debitage and fire-cracked rock. In profile the stain was a very shallow basin in the eastern two-thirds, while a linear stain, possibly a post mold with a four centimeter diameter, was present in the western third. The stain appears to be natural, possibly related to erosion at the edge of a house.







## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N133 E187.1** was a figure-eight-shaped stain measuring 110 by 41 cm and being brown (10YR4/3) in color when it was first encountered at 40 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface. The stain disappeared in 10 cm and in profile it appeared as two shallow basins with irregularly shaped walls and floor. No cultural material was recovered and the stains are interpreted as probably natural.



## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N133.3 E178** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 50 x 40 cm and being brown (10YR4/3) in color at the Apz/B1 interface, which was encountered at 40 cmbgs. The stain was only seven centimeters deep and in profile was an irregularly shaped shallow basin. Quartz debitage was recovered from 40 to 45 cmbgs. This stain is interpreted as likely being natural




Anomaly **N133.7 E179** was an amorphous-shaped stain that started out as a dark concentration of xxx (10YR 2/2) soil at 40 cmbgs. At 40 cmbgs, the stain measured 123 by 75 cm. Excavation continued to 90 cmbgs and the stain was found to branch out to the west and it was interpreted as a rodent burrow. Cultural material recovered consisted of quartz and charcoal from 40-55 cmbgs. No cultural material was recovered below 55 cmbgs.



## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N134.4 E182.2** was a fire-cracked rock concentration measuring 40 by 25 cm and being wholly concentrated from 40 top 45 cmbs in the upper surface of the B1 horizon within a dark yellowish brown (10YR4/6) matrix. Along with the fire cracked rock, charcoal, Native pottery, and quartz debitage were recovered. The lack of oxidation or fire-reddening may indicate that this represents a dump area versus a hearth.


## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N135 E186.5** was an irregularly-shaped stain measuring 120 by 105 cm and being brown (10YR 4/3) and mottled brown and dark yellowish brown (10YR4/3 and 10YR4/6) in color at 40 cmbgs, the Apz/B1 interface, where it first was visible. In profile, the anomaly appeared as a large-sized, deep pit feature. The walls of the pit were strait-sided and the floor was flat. Larger rocks were located in the northern half and were adjacent to the southern and southeastern sides. The irregular shape observed at 40 cmbgs, resolved itself into a round 50 cm diameter stain by 55 cmbgs. The anomaly extended to a depth of 85 cmbgs. Cultural material recovered from this anomaly consisted of shell (recovered from a small pocket adjacent to the main stain at 40 cmbgs), charcoal, rhyolite and quartz debitage, calcined bone, fish vertebrae, Native pottery, fire-cracked rock, carbonized maize kernels, and an argillite scraper. A pocket of darker brown (10YR 5/6) was encountered at 60 cmbgs adjacent to the southeast edge of the main anomaly. This smaller stain had a higher concentration of charcoal and calcined bone as well as a large unworked argillite cobble which took up most of the 15 cm diameter stain. Excavation revealed that this smaller stain was an intrusive rodent burrow which was apparently filled with hearth debris and the argillite cobble as a means of prehistoric pest control during the life of the larger storage pit. The rodent stain continue in the same location until it disappeared at 80 cmbgs.


Anomaly **N134.2 E187.55** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 37 by 33 cm and being brown (10YR4/3) in color at 40 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface. One rock was located on the western half of the stain. Excavation revealed a rock that quickly covered the entire surface of the stain and beyond. No cultural material was recovered and the stain, identified as a shallow basin that bottomed out on a rock, is considered natural.



## **Lot 5 House**

Anomaly **N135.5 E174.9** was an oval shaped stain measuring 100 by 60 cm that was bisected by the wall of the house envelope. At 45 cmbgs where it was first encountered, it was very dark brown (10YR 2/2) in color. The stain extended to 60 cmbgs and appeared to be a shallow basin. Cultural material recovered consisted of quartz and rhyolite debitage, Native pottery, calcined bone, charcoal and fire-cracked rock.

Anomaly **N134.6 E174.6** was an oval stain measuring 35 by 25 cm which was bisected by the wall of the house envelope. The stain was very dark grayish brown (10YR3/2) in color and was only five centimeters deep. No cultural material was recovered and the stain, a very shallow basin, is believed to be natural.





## **Lot 5 House**

Anomaly **N135.5 E178.4** was an amorphous-shaped stain that had originally been identified by University of Massachusetts Amherst Site Examination testing. The stain measured 230 by 110 cm at 40 cmbgs where it was first encountered and consisted of several pocket so mottled colors dark grayish brown (10YR 4/2), olive brown (2.5Y 4/4), and light olive brown (2.5Y 5/4). The testing strategy for this anomaly consisted initially of the excavation of two parallel trenches (A-A', B-B') oriented north to south across the width of the anomaly. Excavation of these trenches revealed that the anomaly was in fact, at least one, and possibly two, rodent runs. Two additional sections of the runs were excavated (c-C' and D-D') to confirm the initial identification. Cultural material recovered consisted of quartz and rhyolite debitage, brick, Native pottery, fire cracked rock, and charcoal, all in the upper 10 cm.




## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N136.3 E180.4** was a oval-shaped stain with fire-cracked rock visible on the surface at 40 cmbgs, the Apz/ B1 interface. The stain was brown (10YR4/3) in color and was only 5 cm in depth. The anomaly appeared to be a surficial concentration of fire cracked rock possibly representing a dump area near a house.

Anomaly **N137.2 E180.4** appeared as a round-shaped stain at 40 cmbgs, the depth of the Apz/ b1 interface. The stain measured 50 by 55 cm and was brown (10YR4/3) in color throughout its excavation. It was found that the stain extended to 60 cmbgs with only one piece of fire-cracked rock being recovered from the west half at 40 cmbgs. The stain lost its rounded shape as excavation proceeded, eventually revealing itself to be a rodent run.






Anomaly **N136.4 E183.5** was an irregular oval-shaped stain which was impacted by the western wall of the turkey coop and which had several large rocks to the south. Due to the presence of built-up soil associated with the turkey coop, this stain was first visible at 75 cmbgs, or 40 cm below original ground surface at the Apz/B1 interface. The stain measured 110 by 70 cm and was brown (10YR4/3). The stain extended to 70 cm below the original ground surface, at which point it was apparent that this was a rodent run. Artifacts recovered included Native pottery, quartz debitage, historic clay pipe stem, and redware.






Anomaly **N136.8 E179.2** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 83 by 70 cm that was first encountered at 40 cmbgs at the Apz/B1.. At this level it was brown (10YR4/3) in color and extended to 75 cmbgs. In profile the stain was somewhat enigmatically shaped. It did not have straight edges for the most part and was very mottled in color throughout. Cultural material recovered consisted of quartz and rhyolite debitage and fire-cracked rock. This anomaly was identified as a possible medium-size medium-depth pit that was subsequently impacted by natural agencies such as roots.



## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N137.65 E178.5** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 63 by 55 cm that was brown(10YR4/3) in color. It was first visible at the Apz/ B1 interface (40 cmbgs) and extended to 50 cmbgs. Only a small amount of charcoal was recovered from the 40-45 cmbgs level. In profile the stain appeared as a medium-sized shallow basin with a rounded bottom and gently sloping sides. It is unknown if this stain is cultural or natural.




Anomaly **N138 E179.6** was bisected by the wall of the proposed housing envelope, resulting in only half of it being excavated. The portion of the stain that was in the impact area measured 56 cm long and extended 30 cm into the impact area. In profile, the walls of the stain sloped slightly away from the edges at 40 cmbgs, the depth at which the stain was originally uncovered (the Apz/ B1 interface). The bottom of the stain was very flat and the wall junction with it was a rounded right angle. The stain extended to a total depth of 70 cmbgs and appears to have been a medium-sized, medium-depth pit. Cultural material recovered was limited to quartz debitage from 40-45 cmbgs and small pieces of charcoal from 60-65 cmbgs.





## Lot 5 House

Anomaly **N138.8 E177.7** was an oval-shaped stain measuring 70 by 35 cm that was first visible at 40 cmbgs at the Apz./ B1 interface. The stain was very dark grayish brown (10YR 3/2) in color and extended to 55 cmbgs. Cultural material was limited to quartz debitage and charcoal from the upper five centimeters of the stain. Excavation revealed an irregularly shaped shallow basin profile which appeared to be natural, likely the result of floral activity.
